WhoWhatWhereWhyWhenHow?

Happy New Year, everyone! This column is intended to help us keep in mind dates to remember in the Church Year, as well as our calendar year, and special events in our church family life. It is also where you can get an explanation of what occurs in our worship services or of an unfamiliar word or term in a hymn or Scripture reading. The altar and pulpit paraments and Pastor's stole are white during the Christmas season and through the second Sunday after the Epiphany when we begin using green. White signifies perfection, joy, and purity; green reminds us of our abiding life in Christ, nourishment from His Word and growth in our faith.

Sunday, January 1st, is set aside in celebration of the **Baptism of Our Lord**. **Epiphany** is always **January 6th** and has been celebrated since 361AD, to recall the visit of the Magi to the Infant Jesus.

Sunday, February 5th, we can remember the Old Testament Patriarch Jacob.

Saturday, February 18th, is remembered as the date of Martin Luther's death. He never wanted to have a church body named after him. He lost that argument as there are at least 40 Lutheran church bodies in the United States alone!

Shrove Tuesday is February 21st, which is 47 days before Easter. Shrove is the past tense of "shrive", which means to confess. So, why pancakes and our always anxiously awaited Potato Pancake Supper?

To prepare for the holy Lenten season, and not be tempted to indulge in rich foods, it became the practice to use up eggs, milk

and sugar before Lent began. Pancakes were the perfect solution! We make 800 or more!!

Ash Wednesday is on **February 22nd** this year. Ashes are imposed in the shape of a cross on the forehead or back of the hand during Ash Wednesday services and signify confession of and mourning for our sins. Whether or not to give up something for Lent is an individual decision. We do not display altar flowers during Lent. There are always secular holidays and occasions to be recognized, too! A few are: **Presidents' Day** is Monday, January 20th. Are you old enough to remember when Presidents Lincoln and Washington had their own birthdays shown on our calendars?

We enjoy having **church family potluck** meals on 5th Sundays. There'll be one on **January 29th**. This is a great time to get better acquainted with other church members.

February 2nd isn't only Groundhog's Day, but it is also **Pastor McKee's birthday!** (We don't know if he casts a shadow or not.)

We're all aware that **February 14th** is **Valentine's Day**. Saint Valentine is remembered for his witness for Christ, which ultimately condemned him to death by beating, stoning, and beheading in the year 269. His feast day has been on Catholic, Anglican, Lutheran and other church bodies' liturgical calendars since the 1600s.

Looking ahead, our always successful **Rummage Sale** is scheduled for **Saturday, April 22nd**.

Synopsis of Council Meetings

In the interest of being fully transparent as we conduct the Lord's business, the Church Council provides this synopsis of the Council meetings from September through December, as well as of the Annual Voters' Meeting in November.

The income/expense financials are on target for the year.

At the Annual Meeting, the following were re-elected to two-year terms: Randy

Priem, President; Linda Ryun, Financial Secretary; and Linda Williams, Trustees. Linda Ryun is unable to serve due to having a massive stroke. Randy Priem will appoint someone who is willing to fulfill the duties of Financial Secretary.

The Proposed Spending Guide for 2023 of \$135,645 was approved by the Voters. Pastor McKee reported that Jean Methlie, Jean (Jay) Poffenbaugh, Donna Rice, Connie Smith, and Don and Barbara Thomas were called to eternal glory during 2022. The Voters accepted into membership William and Linda Bohannon; Robert and Lori DeChello and sons Glenn and Zander; and Richard and Joan Hulse. Carla Ruttinger requested and was granted a peaceful release from membership.

Due to a power outage caused by a lightning strike, the organ became inoperable and could not be repaired. A new organ was dedicated on Sunday, December 4. The cost was \$36,000 (reduced from \$45,000), of which \$21,000 was covered by insurance, \$7,000 was pledged, and the congregation approved the balance to be paid from an LCEF account.

The Thanksgiving Community Meal was attended by more than 110. A lasagna dinner is planned for December.

A Potato Pancake Supper was scheduled for Shrove Tuesday, February 21st, and a Rummage Sale for Saturday, April 22nd. The Trustees have been monitoring the water/well for sediment and air in the lines. Under their supervision, the parking lot was resealed as a safety feature; however, in the future it will be necessary to repave it at an expense in excess of \$45,000.

The response to the Toys for Tots drive was tremendous due to the efforts of Bob Sullivan, who also serves as the Dunnellon area coordinator.

Your Past Does Not Define Your Future

New Year's is a celebration of the past and the future. We take stock of the past with thanksgiving and sometimes even relief (that it's over), and we look to the future in hope and anticipation, and perhaps with some worry, for what it holds.

The point is that New Year's celebrations remind us of who we are as opposed to who we would like to be, what we have done in comparison to what we want to do. It reminds us of our accomplishments, but mostly it reminds us of our failures. What we've lost. Who we've lost. New Year's is our own version of Charles Dickens' classic, *A Christmas Carol*. And we all play Scrooge. We are visited by the ghosts of our pasts, presents and futures.

St. Paul writes: "The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you may abound in every good work. As it is written, 'He has distributed freely, he has given to the poor; his righteousness endures forever.' He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed

for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way for all your generosity, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God" (2 Cor. 9:6–15). St. Paul tells us that the Lord will both supply and increase what we need to give to the church for its work in the world. He tells us that this work God does in us will enrich and bless us in every way, and through this, will produce thanksgiving to God. With this in mind, here is some practical advice to help you take stock of your giving in years past and change what needs to be adjusted, improved, or done away with altogether.

First, attend the Divine Service to receive God's gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation. If you've not been faithful in attending worship to hear the preaching of God's Word, to receive forgiveness and feast on the rich food of our Lord's body and blood for the eternal benefit of your body and soul, then repent and come to receive the gifts God freely gives. God doesn't want your money. He wants you — all of you (Matt. 22:20–22).

Second, pray for the Lord's help. Your right as a Christian is to speak with your Father, the King of all creation, freely through His Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ. Go to the throne of grace and ask for strength and wisdom to follow His bidding faithfully (John 15:1–16).

Third, consider what the church is and what the church does. The church is a place of mercy. It inhales the mercy of the Father by the death, resurrection and ascension of His Son through the preaching of the Gospel and the Sacraments. It exhales this mercy in love toward neighbors. You are a member of the church, of God's family.

Thus, you are not only a recipient of God's mercy, but a bearer of that mercy for the life of the world. You spread that mercy through the generous giving of your income to support the work of the

church in the world, as the Israelites did in the Old Testament (Lev. 27:1–34).

Fourth, take stock of your current giving in light of the New Testament's teaching on supporting the work of the church. Are you giving of your first fruits, taking it out of your paycheck first, or does God get what's left over? Are you giving voluntarily and cheerfully? Are you giving proportionally and generously? The Old Testament required a tithe, or ten percent. The New Testament gives freedom to be generous, to give more for the Church's work. Are you relying on God's promise to provide and increase what you need to do His work? If your answer is no to any of these, repent. If God gave you His only Son, will He not provide for you all things, even physical things? Trust Him, His Word, and heed it.

So, don't let your past define your future. Rather, commit for the year a generous proportion of your income, which is God's gift to you for this body and life.
